Get to Know Your Grants

At their meeting on September 4, the Friends of the OPL Board approved a "wish list" of grants for the library totaling \$210,000! To be spent during the Friends fiscal year (October 1, 2019 – September 30, 2020), these grants will benefit every location and patrons of all ages.

- Children's Services received \$20,000 to pay for performers and supplies systemwide during the next year. (This represents almost 15% of the total Children's Literacy programming budget.)
- Teen Services will have \$41,000 to use for programming (including the Youth Poet Laureate scholarship), support for Youth Leadership Councils and teen volunteers, and prizes for the Summer Passport program.
- Adult Services and Outreach will use \$26,000 to pay for systemwide outreach expenses, special t-shirts to help patrons identify OPL staff, and adult programming at the Main Library.
- Branch Services and AAMLO received \$50,000 to pay for programming, supplies, exhibits, film licenses, furniture and signage, after school snacks, and Play Café refreshments.
- Community Relations will have access to \$22,500 to create a 2018-19 Annual Report, promote OPL activities via social media, procure promotional artwork and photos, and support volunteer appreciation activities.
- OPL staff at all locations will have the chance to apply for \$1,500-2,000 in mini-grant funds (totaling \$20,000) to implement or improve library programs or services.
- The remaining \$30,500 will pay for OPL's collection of Wi-Fi hot spots to lend to patrons, three scholarships for OPL staff pursuing their MLIS degrees, hospitality and training for staff, community partnership opportunities, and much more

These generous grants are only possible thanks to your membership dues, donations, and purchases made at the Bookmark Bookstore. The impact of these funds upon the library is difficult to overstate. There are some long-standing programs that would not be able continue without these grants, and others that will be inspired by this year's commitment. The library would like to thank all Friends members for their part in making this possible!

More, Better Main: Update on the Oakland Downtown Plan

The revised Downtown Oakland Specific Plan was released Aug. 30. Thanks to your help (THANK YOU!!), the revised plan now includes the need for a new and/or expanded Main Library and for improvements to the Main Library to be made (p.153). The Plan also calls for further study of impact fees to fund such improvements (p. 263).

While these revisions are a crucial step in bringing a new/updated Main Library to fruition, the Plan also raised several issues Library Advocates will address. We will request that the City Planning Staff make the following revisions:

- 1. In many places, the Plan speaks about the Main serving as a "shelter" for the homeless. The library provides shelter, but is not a shelter - a key difference. Members of the Library staff are not trained in social work, and the homeless community deserves the best resources the City can offer. Moreover, the Library must meet and balance the needs of all populations in the community. Even when expanded, the Main Library should not be viewed as a permanent daytime shelter for the homeless.
- 2. The value of the Main Library as an incubator of economic development was not mentioned. The Main Library offers job fairs for teens and adults; @oaklandhasjobs, an Instagram account displaying current job openings in Oakland, and educational programs for job seekers. It also offers resources for grant seekers and business developers. More space would allow the Main to offer additional programming, meeting rooms, coworker spaces and a makerspace where 3-D printers and other devices could be more readily used by the public.
- 3. The role the Library plays in supporting youth was not emphasized. The report focused on disconnected black teens feeling unwelcome in the downtown area. It did not highlight the many ways that the Library provides educational and recreational resources and programming for young people. Examples include: the Youth Poet Laureate contest (and college scholarship), the Youth Leadership Council, volunteer opportunities in the Library, children's story times, and free food programs.
- 4. Although downtown development is viewed through an equitable framework, the role of the digital divide in Oakland and how the Library helps meet that challenge was not discussed. Between July 2018 and June 2019, free public computers were used in more than 61,000 sessions. Additionally, the Library offers free Internet access, blackand-white and color printing, free checkout of Wi-Fi hot spots and free individualized tutoring. Since the store opened in its current location at 721 Washington Street in 1995, it has been powered by a civic-minded, book-loving, library-cheering group of volunteers. The Bookmark represents a unique opportunity to support the Oakland Public Library, and our volunteers generously support that mission with their time and engagement in this special store.

When The Bookmark Bookstore was profiled in 2005 by the San Francisco Chronicle, it was described as "a bookstore and curiosity shop." Fourteen years later, The Bookmark has thousands of books and media selections to peruse and certainly still has curiosities - you never know what you're going to find in our store or online!

While e-book sales continue to steadily rise worldwide, paperbacks and hardbacks still outsell them by a large margin. Unlike the disruption that digital media has caused for the news publishing and music business, people still love their physical books. This love of physical books and continuing efforts by consumers to buy used instead of new has led to a steady increase in The Bookmark's sales over the last several years. Strong sales of books, media, and Friends of the OPL Memberships at The Bookmark mean more opportunities to support the OPL. What could be better than that?! We are most grateful for our store volunteers, loyal patrons, Friends of the OPL Members, store manager, and donors.

FUN FACTS ABOUT THE BOOKMARK

In 1992, The Bookmark first opened at 817 Washington, up the street from its current location. In 1995, the store moved to its current location, 721 Washington. Friends Board members teamed up with a handful of store volunteers to move hundreds of books down the street. We have come a long way since 1992. Today we have....

Amazing, full-time store manager, Phyllis Coulliard, who keeps the store running smoothly and always keeps the mission in mind: supporting the Oakland Public Library!

Why do people volunteer at The Bookmark?

Our volunteers love books, they want to give back to the community, and they want to support the library.

Why do we always need volunteers?

We are open seven days a week with many 3-hour shifts to fill. We have a very diverse group of volunteers and there can be turnover due to changes in their lives that make it hard to keep volunteering. Our job is to always be recruiting and prepared for anything!

How do the volunteers spend their time?

Bookmark volunteers have a range of responsibilities including: pricing, shelving, and culling books, helping customers find books or sections, promoting Friends of the OPL memberships, running the cash register and iPad for credit card and cash sales, answering phones, processing incoming donations, looking up and listing books for sale on Amazon and eBay, keeping up the store, and suggesting themes for table and window displays. Wow, our volunteers are busy and engaged! Whatever your volunteering goals are, The Bookmark has something for everyone.
