More Library at Your Library! Expanded Library Hours Starting April 1

OPL is expanding hours at its 16 neighborhood branches, the Main Library, the African American Museum and Library at Oakland (AAMLO), and the Oakland Tool Lending Library starting Monday, April 1, 2019.

The Main Library (125 14th St.) and 81st Avenue Branch (1021 81st Ave.) will be open seven days a week; 14 neighborhood branches will be open six days per week and until 8 p.m. two nights per week. In addition, all library locations will now be open Mondays.

This marks the first time OPL has increased its operating hours since 2004. The new hours are a result of the June 2018 passage of Measure D, which Oakland voters approved handily with 76.9% of the vote. Oakland Public Library locations will be open a total of 288.5 additional hours per week.

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It's Official: Jamie Turbak Named Oakland Public Library Director

After serving as interim director since March 2018, following Gerry Garzón's retirement and a national search, the Oakland Public Library confirmed Jamie Turbak's appointment as Director of Library Services on Friday, January 18. She becomes OPL's 13th director since the City incorporated public library services in 1878.

Turbak graduated from UC Berkeley with a B.A. in English and earned her Master of Library Science from San Jose State. She began her career as an on-call library aide at Berkeley Public Library. In 2001, she joined OPL as an entry-level, temporary part-time Library Assistant and has worked her way up through the system as a Children's Librarian, Branch Manager, Supervising Librarian for Children's Services and the Main Branch, Administrative Librarian, Associate Director and, most recently, as Interim Director of Library Services.

Turbak will focus her attention to the expansion of library services in 2019, with the goal of developing system-wide policies and services that are most user-friendly for library patrons. Oaklanders recently passed Measure D, a \$75 parcel tax that will generate an estimated \$10



million per year for library services and operations. "This is an incredibly exciting time for the Oakland Public Library and it is a deep honor to be the Director of Library Services in this vibrant city," said Turbak. "In 2019, we plan to have all library locations open more hours, improve our web-based services, embark on new partnerships with community organizations, and implement policy changes that will make the library more user-friendly. I'm proud to work alongside passionate, committed, and focused library staff who drive improvements in our service each and every day."

Get to Know Your Grants

For the third year in row, the Friends of the OPL offered mini-grants (up to \$2,000) to fund the implementation of a new library service or program proposed by library staff. At their meeting in early January, the Friends of OPL Board reviewed 22 creative and inspiring applications.

OPL Advocates and the Quest for a New Main Library

The City of Oakland recently released its Draft Downtown Development Plan—and guess what's missing from the city's vision of our future?

A new Main Library.

The Downtown Plan is an opportunity to guide development with our vision for our city. It is our opportunity to stake a claim to what we are as a community—and a city.

The plan projects more than 65,000 new residents and 40,000 new units in the downtown. The Downtown Plan emphasizes culture, the arts, affordability and equity, but fails to recognize the role the Main Library plays as an existing resource addressing all of these needs. Serving patrons of all ages, linguistic groups, and education levels, the library is a great equalizer, and a space where, in our diversity, we create a shared public culture.

The current Main Library was built in 1950. While it is heavily used and much loved, the role and services provided by the library have changed. The building is out of room and outdated for current public uses. It leaks and is burdened with a number of failing systems. It offers only one small space for public programming, which is shared by children's, teen and adult library services. The space is already inadequate for the high usage it enjoys, and the projected surge of population in the city will overwhelm it.

The Main offers many resources and programs that help people lead healthier lives. Examples include giving out free flu shots; holding classes on infant health; presenting yoga classes for all ages; serving free lunches to people 18 and younger during the summer months when schools are closed, and holding open hours with VA representatives who help veterans find



the health resources they need. The Main Library's Second Start Adult Literacy Program helps adults improve their reading skills. The Children's Room and TeenZone at the Main Library provide curriculum support and a safe place to go after school.

With the renaissance of the downtown, we have the opportunity to commit to a once-in-a-generation institutional project: a new Main Library. A 21st-century facility with increased space can serve Oakland's diverse and growing population. If you agree that Oakland should plan for a new Main Library that meets the needs of our rapidly changing city, please add your voice NOW to the Downtown Plan process. 2019 Open Spaces Program Grants | Kenneth Rainin Foundation

After a panel of jurors reviewed public art projects from 10 finalists, two of the five grants awarded went to OPL partnerships. In total, the Foundation awarded \$625,000 for these community-based public art projects.

The OPL-partnered grantees are:

Commons Archive – Kala Art Institute, the Golden Gate Library and lead artist Sue Mark will foster connections across race, generation and class to address the dissolution of neighborhood networks by displacement and gentrification. They will engage residents of North Oakland's Golden Gate neighborhood, the birthplace of the Black Panthers, to create a collective memory bank through citizen history trainings, community mapping and restorative justice listening sessions. The stories will be translated into projections and banners displayed along San Pablo Avenue.

Heroes of Unity – The Spanish-Speaking Unity Council of Alameda County and the Oakland Public Library will partner with lead artists, Sergio de la Torre and the Collective Action Studio's Justin Hoover and Chris Treggiari, to create a portrait of the Bay Area immigrant



community. Youth and adult artist mentorship teams will bring mobile print-making laboratories to six events in Oakland. The public will be empowered to create art that documents personal and family stories of migration, relocation, identity and citizenship.

Available as audiobook from <u>Hoopla</u> and the <u>OPL's Overdrive collection</u>.


